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# A Word From The Pastor

Let me share five ways to be a responsible Christian:

1. God wants us to be a member of a local church. This is the purpose of fellowship. Following Christ is not just a matter of believing—it is also belonging. We are meant to live in relationship with each other (1 Pet. 1:3; Eph. 2:19).

2. God wants us to model His character. He wants every believer to grow to be like Jesus Christ. This is the biblical definition of spiritual maturity (1 Pet. 2:21). First Timothy 4:12 gives specific areas in which we are to model Christ's character. "...set an example for the believers in speech, in life, in love, in faith and in purity." Maturity is not measured by one's learning, but by one's lifestyle.

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3. God wants us to be ministers of His grace. He expects us to use the gifts, talents, and opportunities He gives us to benefit others. First Peter 4:10 says, "Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others..." Every believer should be involved in ministry.

4. God wants us to be messengers of His love. Once we become a Christian we become God's messengers of the Good News of Jesus Christ. Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 5:19-20, 19 "God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting men's sins against them. And He has committed to us the message of reconciliation. 20 We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us." Remember, there are only two things we cannot do in heaven that we can do on earth: sin and witness to unbelievers.

5. God wants us to magnify His name. Each of us has a personal responsibility to worship God. The Psalmist wrote, "Glorify the Lord with me; let us exalt his name together." There is an inborn need in every human to worship. If we don't worship God we will find something else to worship. When we do this we sin against God.

Because our renovation in the Worship Center will not quite be complete we will have two Christmas Eve Services in the Conference Center. So, you will be able to choose one of two times, 4 and 5:30 PM, on Christmas Eve to attend a special time of worship. It will include awesome music and speaking about the night that Christ was born.

Christmas Day falls on a Sunday this year and we will have only one activity at the church that day. We will have one worship service at 10 AM. This service will be different than the Christmas Eve service.

We hope you will make plans now to be at all our worship services in December and that you will bring your family and friends with you.

We have a goal for our services in December: In each service we want God to be worshiped by all people who attend: those who know Him well, those who are not as close as they once were, and those who do not know Him.

# small groups

In early August, the Student Leadership Team (SLT)—a group of six high school and college students at our church that meet with Andy to plan activities for the youth—met to discuss, among other things, a need for change in our current model of Bible Study on Sunday mornings. Traditionally, the youth class would cover a certain passage of scripture and then discuss it; the new idea involved taking that scripture and applying it on a much more personal level, and in a format outside of the Sunday-morning routine. As a group, we agreed that the unity and fellowship we experience in the youth was something too special and important to be confined to Saturdays at SNL or Sundays in Bible study or Mosaic. What good is the “life together” if it’s a life only possible on the weekends?

Thus, Small Groups was born. This new time of fellowship and Bible study takes place on Wednesday nights from 6:30 until whenever the individual groups feel like they’re finished. Led by Andy and various students of the Student Leadership Team, we discuss a passage of scripture (currently, the book of Philippians) which Andy gives a message about during the Bible Study Hour on the Sunday morning preceding the Wednesdays that we meet. During Small Groups, we explore how what we read about in scripture applies to our lives, or how we should apply it. Since these groups are “small” (hence the name) and much more personal than the large group of youth on Sunday mornings, it gives students a chance to really talk about the struggles, experiences, and triumphs of their own lives, and connects those in the group on a much deeper level of support and fellowship. We make memories, encourage each other, look to scripture for support, and above all else, we pray. Though we consider this semester to be a time of experimentation in regards to Small Groups, the meetings are, thus far, a success.

One clear benefit of Small Groups, aside from the personal level of interaction, is the honesty that emerges. So much of the time, we as church members meet with our “church friends” and talk about “church things” and try, as hard as we possibly can, to hide our faults. Despite that we worship a Savior who died to free us from our “slavery to sin”, as Paul says in Romans 6:20, we still struggle as Christians to be honest about our day-to-day temptations, failures,

and short-comings, as if admitting to these will somehow suggest that we’re not fully committed to following Christ. We get so wrapped up in obeying the rules, playing the part even when it doesn’t feel honest, and saving face, so to speak, that we create the illusion of being “fine”. Small Groups allows students, who are under so many social, family, and academic pressures almost every day, to bring their struggles out into the open with friends and fellow Christians with whom they feel comfortable. Once the struggles are out in the open, they can be addressed, and most importantly, prayed for.

I’ve mentioned prayer twice now, and for a very specific reason. Having been in the youth almost all of high school, I know how scary and strange it feels to pray in front of other people, even your peers. Last spring, Andy led a class in Mosaic called Prayer Group, in which various students met only to pray for each other, for our upcoming mission trip, and for our church. At first, I sounded awkward and hesitant, searching for the pretty words without making it obvious that I was. By the end of it, I’d pretty much overcome my fear of praying in front of other youth, realizing that it wasn’t for them—it was for God.

We’ve carried the idea of Prayer Group over into Small Groups, and we spend a good portion of each meeting just giving prayer requests and then praying for each other. The honesty aspect has come into play here as well, at least for my group; the very first meeting, the girls admitted to each other that “we really don’t know how to pray.” We started from there, and we’re still learning.

In the end, Small Groups is continuing ideas of *koinonia* and the “life together”. Andy, in a weekly letter he sends to the leaders of Small Groups, stated, “When you look it [*koinonia*] up, you’ll see words like fellowship, participation, sharing, and contribution. It is that word that is at the heart of the idea of the Life Together, and it is that idea that is behind why we do these small groups.”

To sum it all up, we’re growing—as a group of students and as young members of this body of Christ, we’re learning how to live as family; to love, encourage, and aid each other through our individual walks with Jesus. He’s doing amazing things, and we’re excited for the future.

# Missions

At a recent Missions Team meeting, some members of the staff were invited to come in and discuss both the current mission work and future direction of the mission activity of Del Norte Baptist Church. To give everyone a better understanding of Del Norte's involvement in local and state wide missions we listed the following activities that members of Del Norte are currently involved in:

- School Supplies and Back Packs to students at Governor Bent Elementary and recently to McKinley Mid School
- Sole to Soul - A shoe ministry at Christmas
- English as a second language (ESL)
- Helping Hands which offers handyman services to people outside the church
- Baptist Builders
- Baptist Disaster Relief
- Campers on Mission
- Hispanic Church work
- Melodrama – an outreach to the community and profits are given to charities and to Del Norte's international mission efforts
- Thanksgiving Baskets
- Christmas Camp
- Del Norte's building is made available to the community
- Diaper Drive
- Bags of Hope
- Manna – Youth activity of preparing and giving sandwiches to the homeless
- Children's Mission Organizations: Mission Friends, CIA, GA's

It was discussed how to help all the members of Del Norte understand the extent to which we are involved with missions. The Missions Team wants to extend opportunities to everyone to become involved in a mission effort. One of the ideas was to have a Mission/Ministry Fair. It was decided that the fair should take place in the newly renovated auditorium. So we are planning the fair during 2012, possibly around the time that all of our activities are restarting in the fall. The fair will showcase the mission and ministry activities at Del Norte and give people a chance to sign up to work in those efforts.

The mission team was also tasked with the development of a church wide strategy for missions at Del Norte. The hope is that not only would all of our members be involved in missions, but that we as a church would exhibit a missional lifestyle, and that missions would simply be a part of who we are, and not just something that we do. If you have an interest in getting involved in missions, please prayerfully consider some of the activities listed here and also plan on attending the Mission/Ministry fair and signing up in one of the many activities.

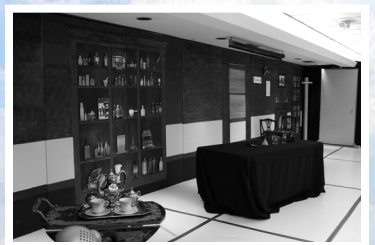
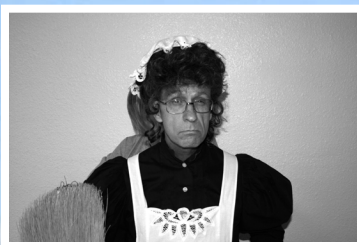


# Little House *on the* Dairy

## Angel Rolls

|                  |                        |
|------------------|------------------------|
| 1 pkg. dry yeast | 1¼ tsp. salt           |
| ¼ cup warm water | 1/3 cup sugar          |
| 1 Tbsp. sugar    | 1 cup scalded milk     |
| 2 egg whites     | 3½ cups flour, divided |
| ¼ shortening     |                        |

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Add 1 Tbsp. sugar and shortening to hot milk. Add yeast and 2 cups flour; blend well. Set aside for 30 minutes. Beat egg whites until light and fluffy. Add to other mixture. Add rest of the flour that has been sifted with salt and 1/3 cup sugar. Let stand 1½ hours. Knead and make rolls. Let rise 30 minutes. Bake at 400 degrees until browned. Remove from oven. Grease tops of rolls with butter.

|                       |
|-----------------------|
| 4 cups flour          |
| 1 Tbsp. baking powder |
| 1 tsp. salt           |
| 1½ cups warm water    |
| 2½ Tbsp. shortening   |

Mix first 4 ingredients. Work shortening in and add water. Mix well. Make dough balls and rub a small bit of oil over the dough. Let stand, covered with plastic wrap for 20 minutes. Roll out and deep fry in hot oil.
