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A Word From The Pastor

In this space in the past I have talked about What is a Baptist?, about what it means to be a responsible Christian, and about the Foundations for a Healthy Church. For this issue I would like to take the opportunity to explain a Baptist distinctive, namely baptism by immersion. Since there are several different views of baptism, we must look to the Bible for definitive instruction. In short, we believe that...

1. Baptism is commanded in Scripture.

It is not a suggestion, nor an optional act reserved only for the very pious. Both Jesus and Peter commanded that all believers be baptized. Matthew 28:19(NIV) "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit..." Acts 10:48(NIV) So he ordered that they be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. Then they asked Peter to stay with them for a few days.

2. The Bible teaches that baptism is through full submersion as opposed to sprinkling.

The Greek word, baptizo, literally means to dip, to plunge or submerge. A close look at passages such as Mat-

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thew 3:16 and Acts 8:38 describe actions which would be unnecessary if sprinkling was the prescribed method. Matthew 3:16(NIV) As soon as Jesus was baptized, he went up out of the water. At that moment heaven was opened, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and lighting on him. Acts 8:38(NIV) And he gave orders to stop the chariot. Then both Philip and the eunuch went down into the water and Philip baptized him.

3. Only believers, those who have already repented and received Christ, are eligible for baptism.

Infant baptism is nowhere taught in the scriptures and our practice of baby dedication should not be confused with baptism. Mark 1:5(NIV) The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River. Acts 2:41(NIV) Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand were added to their number that day.

4. Baptism is a believer's way of giving a visual testimony of the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus.

It is not a means for gaining salvation, but rather a means to identify with and testify about Christ's salvation. It is the public demonstration of the believer's faith. Romans 6:3-4(NIV) 3Or don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? 4We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.

Amazing Wonders Aviation begins at a vintage airstrip. Kids will take off each day from the Worship Rally Hangar and fly to some of the world's greatest natural wonders as they encounter an awesome God and His amazing power.

Day One "Amazing! God's Power Over Nature". For children, recognizing God at work in nature is the gateway to recognizing Him at work in all aspects of their lives. God stopped the flood waters of the Jordan River for the Israelites to enter the promised land.

Day Two "Amazing! God's Power Over Circumstances". God closed the mouths of the lions and Daniel was kept safe from harm. A lifetime of watching God at work and continual contact through prayer gave Daniel confidence that God was in control of kings, kingdoms, and kitties.

Cheesy Canyon Pockets

- · Bread slices (2 per sandwich)
- · Cheese slices (1 per sandwich)
- · Melted Butter
- · Round Cookie Cutter

Use the cookie cutter to cut circles from the bread and cheese slices. Place a piece of cheese between two pieces of bread. Dip a fork in water and press the tips of the tines around the edge of the bread to seal. Place each pocket on a baking sheet. Brush the top of each pocket with melted butter. Bake at 350 degrees until toasty and brown.

Coral Reef Sticks

- · Refrigerated pie crust
- · 1 tablespoon of sugar
- · 1 tablespoon of butter, melted
- · Colored sprinkles
- · Paper plates

Roll the pie crust into a 12-by-10-inch rectangle. Spread the rectangle with melted butter, sugar, sprinkles. Cut the pie crust lengthwise into 20 strips. Cut each strip crosswise into 3 strips. Twist each strip into the cookie sheet to prevent them from unraveling.

Bake the strips in a 350 degree oven for 15-20 minutes. Remove immediately and cool on a wire rack.

Victoria Falls in a Cup

- · 2 packages of blue gelatin
- · 2 cups boiling water, divided
- · 11/2 cups cold water, divided
- · Ice cubes

- · 1 cup whipped topping
- · 6 ounce clear plastic cups
- · Plastic spoon

Mix 1 cup of boiling water with one package of gelatin. Stir until completely dissolved. Stir in 1 cup of cold water. Pour into eight of the cups. Refrigerate until gelatin is firm.

Add the remaining boiling water to the remaining package of gelatin. Stir until completely dissolved. Add enough ice cubes to the remaining cold water to measure 1 cup. Stir the water and ice cubes into the gelatin until thickened. Whisk the whipped topping into the gelatin until well blended.

Spoon the whipped topping and gelatin mixture over the top of the prepared cups. Refrigerate 3 hours or until firm.

Lava, Lava Slushy

- · Rock salt (1/3 cup per)
- · Ice (2 cups per)
- · Orange Juice
- · Large zip lock bag
- · Small zip lock bag

Place two cups of ice into the large bag, and add the rock salt. Pour the orange juice into a small bag and seal tightly.

Place the small bag inside of the large bag, make sure they are both sealed tightly. Shake the bags until the juice turns slushy. Pour into a cup, add a straw, enjoy your lava, lava slushy.



The last weekend of March, Andy, Joni, Mark Acton, Michael and Kaitlyn Hickman, and I travelled to Irving, Texas for the Youth Specialties Leadership Conference, aka YS Palooza. We heard from various speakers about how to connect with students at the middle and high school grades, the roles we must play with them as leaders, and what it really means to work with youth. As leaders of small groups of high school students, we each had room to learn and grow, and came back with some interesting ideas. One speaker—Walt Mueller struck such a chord with me, that I felt a need to share it with the rest of our church body.

Mueller is the author of a number of books that discuss youth culture—the "soup" as he calls it, in which students and teenagers live. At YS Palooza, he spoke to us about five areas of culture that we as youth leaders need to be especially aware of. Bringing up things like technology and the growing (unconscious) reality of Narcissism, he first touched on the idea of amorality. Not immorality—amorality. While every aspect of culture—music, advertising, movies, sexuality—present obstacles to today's young people, there is perhaps no more alarming a wall than that of this concept of amorality.

So what is it? Amorality is not the non-existence of morals (immorality), but rather, for the sake of this discussion, the complete disbelief in morals. There was a time when you could disapprove of an action on the basis that such behavior was "immoral." Some people would scoff at a Christian for this, but more than likely, the offender would feel some guilt, however small, at his actions. But, according to Mueller, the "soup" has changed, and if we as Christians do not step out of our own paradigm for a moment to see the world as secular society sees it, all our attempts to spread the good news of Christ with the next generation will fall on deaf ears.

Mueller phrased it perfectly in his explanation of amorality: in the modern world in which youth are growing up, "the only sin is believing that there is sin." In other words, all behavior is socially acceptable as long as it feels good, makes you happy, doesn't hurt anyone else, etc. There are no such things as "morals." No behavior is inherently good or bad. No one is the authority, the ultimate truth-holder, on correct conduct. Nothing is wrong (except maybe breaking man-made laws). The only thing that can make you a bad person (again, with the exception of breaking the law) is to believe that you know the "right" way, that you have access to the ultimate authority of truth, and thus that you have the right to say to another person, "No, you can't do _____ because it's a sin." This is the moral and cultural climate—the zeitgeist—of my generation and those following, and even perhaps of the one that came before.

Now you might be thinking, "Big surprise—it's all about being politically correct. What else is new?" But I'm afraid this is much bigger than that. Why? Because if people do not believe in sin, then they do not believe that anything they are doing is wrong. They do not believe in damnation, because no one has the authority to condemn their actions. Thus, they do not "need" Jesus. They don't

"need" salvation, and the "good news" is only more religious blather and a list of rules. Think about it: if you didn't believe that your actions condemn you, what glory, what joy or happiness is there in the belief of a Savior to redeem you from that fate?

So then how do we reach the amoral culture God has placed us in? We have to live our faith, make people curious as to why we're different—why we don't engage in behaviors that are culturally acceptable to non-believers, and yet do not treat those non-believers with scorn and condemnation. We need to be conscious of the ever-changing soup we live in, and to understand why the younger generation seems immune to the "guilt" of sin. And above all, we need to love. Near the end of his life, Jesus told his disciples "As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:35 NIV).

This is the only answer we need to the problem of amorality: the world's perception of sin may be changing, but God's love is constant and powerful. He knew that our culture would come to this point, and I believe he placed us in this particular culture for a reason. If we are Christians full of God's love and overflowing with it, than we don't need to explain to an amoral generation why sin as we define it is wrong: all we need to do is show that the love we find in Christ is so much better than temporary pleasures of any given sin. To me, it seems harder to explain why an action is wrong than to demonstrate how beneficial and personally pleasing a better action is. And the youth immersed in the culture of our day really are looking for "better" and "best." So why don't we give them what they want, and show them the better life?

Eagle Nest Construction


