# Summer Abroad

This summer our student ministry is all about the "Summer Abroad".

For starters, you will see students in many of your adult Sunday School classes. The students have been split up into groups of 4 or 5, and as a group they will attend a different Sunday School class every month this summer. So be on the look out for our students on Sunday mornings the next few months and welcome them into your bible study.

Also this summer, we would like to invite everyone to join our students for a couple of different weekly activities. On Sunday nights, starting at 6pm, we will meet at Montgomery Park on Comanche for a time of worship, teaching and fellowship. And on Friday nights, we will continue to have Manna. This is our downtown outreach, where we pass out food and water to people. The summer months are always the biggest, and as of this writing we are already up to 12 loaves of bread, which makes a little over 130 sandwiches. To deal with making so many sandwiches, we have started to meet at 6pm to make sandwiches and then head downtown by about 6:45. We would love to have more people come downtown and

pass out food with us, but we also need people to come at 6 and help us make sandwiches. So please consider coming to make sandwiches, to go with us to pass them out, or even better come and do both. This summer we will also be trying out a new weekly gathering – Tuesdays at the Movies. Every Tuesday afternoon, we'll head to the dollar theater and check out a movie together.

Our students will also be going across the state and across the world. At the beginning of July they will be in Eagle Nest, NM to do VBS and participate in some community events. The first week of August, several of our college students and some leaders will be in Lima, Peru to work with some local missionaries there. And one of our college students, Brandon Key, is currently in Southeast Asia with a group from the BSU.

So be in prayer for our students as they spend this summer out and about, and come join them as they try and follow the words of Paul to "shine like stars" in the midst of the world as they take Jesus across the street and around the world.

# Missions Groups

This year in missions the kids discovered God's work all over the world! Some of the places we "travelled" were; India, Cambodia and South Africa.

When we were in India we learned about the slums of Mumbai. The children saw firsthand how the people who lived there used the same water for cooking, cleaning AND drinking! The missionaries there help provide clean water for these people.

This ministry provides a place for moms who aren't able to care for their babies. The moms put their babies in a hole in a wall at the Door of Hope building. This triggers an alarm and a worker on the other side retrieves the baby. The baby is cared for and a "forever family" is found to adopt them.

We wrapped up the year with a play day! The GA's, Mission Friends and CIA came together to play games and feast on popcorn and cotton candy; thanks to Pastor Kevin!!!

GA's is for all girls in 1st -6th grade, CIA is for boys in 1st-6th grade, and Mission Friends is for children 3 years old up to kindergarten. We get together to learn more about God's love for the people throughout the world. We would love to have more children join us. Our Missions programs start back up September 8th.

# ENSLAVED BY A DEBT OF LOVED BY A

I've never been in debt before—never owed money on a loan, or been hassled by a friend to pay back what was borrowed. I think debt is often a bad word, bringing to mind financial stress and worry. But I'm not sure that's the only connotation of debt.

I love to read Romans in The Message— Paul's writing is often so deep and rich in meaning that I feel I need everything broken down in simple sentences, just to make sure I catch it all. The Message does this well. In Romans 13:8, we read "Don't run up debts, except for the huge debt of love you owe each other. When you love others, you complete what the law has been after all along." This doesn't sound surprising on the surface: we often think of "the law" as the rules and regulations to follow as a believer. We see it as a list of obligations. We use it as a mirror by which to recognize sin (Romans 7:7), and work to correct our behavior. We feel responsible for our actions because the law specifically says what should and should not be done. These words—obligations, responsibility—seem very closely tied to debt, don't they? When we think of debt, we think of an obligation to someone, a financial responsibility. Debt is something that binds us, on whatever terms, to another individual until it is paid off. It's a type of slavery, really.

And yet Paul reminds us that we are indeed slaves: "You have been set free from sin and have become slaves to righteousness" (Romans 6:18 NIV). But again, I think this word "slavery" has adopted a negative connotation—we think of it as a burden, an imprisonment. It's a bondage out

of which we get nothing good in return. But Paul flips this perception on its head: "But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves to God, the benefit you reap leads to holiness, and the result is eternal life" (Romans 6:22 NIV). Here we're told that being a slave is a benefit (at least when we're slaves to an almighty, loving God), and that this benefit leads to holiness and eternal life. We were once slaves to sin and to the strict code of the law, "But now, by dying to what once bound us, we have been released from the law so that we serve in the new way of the Spirit, and not in the old way of the written code" (Romans 7:6 NIV).

Once again, The Message helps me to understand this idea of being free from "the law code" and being bound by the "way of the Spirit": "God went for the jugular when he sent his own Son. He didn't deal with the problem as something remote and unimportant. In his Son, Jesus, he personally took on the human condition, entered the disordered mess of struggling humanity in order to set it right once and for all. The law code, weakened as it always was by fractured human nature, could never have done that. The law always ended up being used as a Band-Aid on sin instead of a deep healing of it. And now what the law code asked for but we couldn't deliver is accomplished as we, instead of redoubling our own efforts, simply embrace what the Spirit is doing in us" (Romans 8:3-4 MSG). By "embracing what the Spirit is doing in us," we're giving Christ complete control of our lives—i.e., we're slaves to His good and perfect will. And in return for this chosen slavery—for of course we must choose to follow Christ—we're

given His hope and peace, and eternal life.

Well now that we understand ourselves to be slaves to the kindest, greatest master, we must ask, what are our duties of service? If we're no longer bound by the law, then what does our new way of obedience tell us to do? For that answer we should go straight to the source, to the words of Jesus himself: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another" (John 13:34 NIV).

Love. That is our new commandment, the new law which we must follow. Yet, Paul maintains that this love was the point all along—this was what the old law was trying to accomplish in us, but which our sinful natures prevented us from fulfilling. Remember, "When you love others, you complete what the law has been after all along" (Romans 13:8 MSG).

So our new duties to our new master— Christ—are summed up in one word: love. Every command ever given was in support of this ideal, was reaching towards this perfect goal. Christ lived a life enslaved in love—He lived a "debt of love" to everyone He encountered. And this wasn't a burden, an unsavory task (although that's not to say that loving people will always be easy)—but it was performed with the understanding that the debt was not a punishment or a responsibility in the painful sense, but rather a bond. Christ bonded with the disciples through love-He bonded with us through the ultimate demonstration of love, His death on the cross (John 15:13 NIV). Love is active, it is a verb requiring movement and intentionality. He made the decision to act.

And in the end He spelled out our "duties" to us, plain as day: "My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you" (John 15:12 NIV). But Jesus, because He's awesome and amazing and the greatest lover you will ever know, didn't stop there. He didn't just tell us what we need to do, He said this: "I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you" (John 15:15 NIV). Although we are slaves, Christ sees us as friends. Yes, He was talking to

the disciples here, but what the disciples learned they taught to us, and so by translation, Christ is speaking to us—He is calling us "friends." You are a friend of God, of Jesus, of the One who holds the universe in His hands. He chooses to call you friend, though you are really servant, slave. He wants your obedience, but He also wants your friendship, your love. In fact, your obedience IS your love—to others, and to Him.

So you see, it IS a debt—it is a lifelong debt that we will never be able to pay off, because there is no bottom of the wallet—there is no end to the love we are given so long as we are living in Christ, the ultimate source of love, and so there is no limit to the love we can give. But we must cling to the source, hold fast to Jesus's hand, if we are to love for the rest of our lives—we cannot continue to pour out without being refilled. Paul alerts us to this constant need for "refueling": "Don't burn out; keep yourselves fueled and aflame. Be alert servants of the Master, cheerfully expectant. Don't quit in hard times; pray all the harder" (Romans 12:11-12 MSG).

My heart has been moved by what God showed me in this message—and it reminds me of how much I love our church, how bonded I feel to the people I know here, and how much I crave to see others joined to us in Christ. I find myself wanting to pay this debt, and it makes me ache for more of God's unending love. It isn't always easy to love, but when I think of what I've done, I can't imagine it was easy for Christ to die for me, to love me that much. But He—the master—chose to pay that debt to me—the wandering, wayward servant—out of some crazy sense of love I will probably never understand. But as love incarnate, He knew and knows what He is doing.

Brothers and sisters—my family—we owe a huge, insurmountable debt. Are we really paying it off? We'll never quite love like Jesus does, but are we trying, every moment of every day, to get closer? I hope so—I pray so. Let us always be mindful of Paul's words: "You can't go wrong when you love others. When you add up everything in the law code, the sum total is love" (Romans 13:10 MSG).
