

WHO GOD SAYS WE ARE

During this year's trip, two important experiences were occurring aside from our VBS and painting work. First, we were experiencing the familiar Life Together. Eating, sleeping, working, playing, worshipping, and praying together for a week can bring people closer than they ever thought possible. It brings us back

to Acts 4:32, and how the early believers were "one in heart and mind" (NIV). We were experiencing time with the family of God, in all its odd and quirky parts.

Second, we were experiencing a little more of God with us. If you've ever been to Eagle Nest, the natural beauty is enough to remind you of how awesome our God is. Add to that some pretty spectacular thunderstorms and vast starry skies, and you have a recipe for humble pie. I never feel so small and yet so close to God as I do in that mountain valley.

Then, on Thursday night we had Lord's supper, but not in any way you would expect. Andy laid out some bread rolls, juice, and cups, and told us to come up as we felt led. He also encouraged us to read John 15-17, in which Jesus prays not only for his disciples, but for future believers like us. Last, Andy told us he would wash our feet and pray over us individually. I could never presume to know what God was doing in the hearts of the students around me, but I know what he was doing in mine: as I sat down after Andy had prayed over

me and I prepared to lift up my usual prayers, I felt this urging to pray for the students around me. Unsure of what would happen, I began to pray for them by name.

By the time I opened my eyes ten minutes or so later, there were tears all around the room. Girls, boys, adults... everyone seemed to be feeling something deeply personal, perhaps even painful. I and other sponsors had the opportunity to pray with and hold weeping students who were feeling God's presence. There was no denying that God was among us and his spirit was moving within us that night. It was one of the most beautiful and humbling things I have ever seen.

Aside from these experiences we were having during the week, we were also presented with a message from Andy each night during worship. This year he spoke about identity: who we are and how we define ourselves. Andy began the message in Matthew 3-4, in which Jesus is being baptized, noting what God says of his son at this start to his ministry: "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased" (3:17 NIV).

Then Andy shared a truth with us that is so often repeated in church, but which can tend to fall on the deaf ears of students who have grown up hearing it every Sunday since they were born: we are God's children, and he loves us. But I think often our human nature seeks a reason for God's love, an explanation for why he could put up with so much failure and sin. We start to look at our morality, our "Christian" behavior, and reason that God loves us because we have committed ourselves to His work and are doing our best. But as Andy would reveal to us, God's love is much more beautiful than that—painfully beautiful. Something so simple and out of our control that it almost hurts to believe despite that it is the greatest news.

To put it in Andy's own words, we often perceive God's love to operate like this: "I love you because I am pleased with you" or "I love you because you're being a good Christian" or "I love you because..." (fill in the blank with whatever else you may feel God could love you for). But the painful truth is that none of those things make God love us-even though we should always strive to please him, it is not our ability to behave or capacity to please him that causes him to love us. Rather, as Andy noted, God's love operates outside of our control: he does not say "I love you because", but "I love you. Therefore...." We can please God by obeying him and accomplishing his will... but he will continue to love us, faithfully pursue our hearts, whether we please him or not. Jesus did not die on the cross for a crowd of God-pleasers, people who had done their best to please him. He died for people he loved.

For anyone living in our country at this time—but perhaps most especially for students and young people—it can be so hard to understand who we are and who we are meant to be. There is so much in the world telling us we're not good enough for this, or too good for that; we are very rarely certain of our place in life or what God has in store for us. We try to discern his will before we even understand who we are to him, or who he is to us. But knowing and having confidence in our identity—which is defined by God himself—is the key to growing closer to him and learning to trust him with our futures.

GOD'S LOVE OPERATES OUTSIDE OF OUR CONTROL: HE DOES NOT SAY "I LOVE YOU BECAUSE", BUT "I LOVE YOU. THEREFORE...."

Author Donald Miller, in his book Searching for God Knows What, connects our search for our identity all the way back to Eden, to that perfect relationship between man and God before man betrayed God. Miller writes, "If man was wired so that something outside himself told him who he was, and if God's presence was giving him a feeling of fulfillment, then when that relationship was broken, man would be pining for other people to tell him that he was good, right, okay with the world, and eternally secure... We all compare ourselves to others, and none of our emotions—like jealousy and envy and lust—could exist unless man was wired so that somebody else told him who he was, and that somebody else was gone."

Does this feel familiar? It does to me. The fact of the matter is that we will never feel whole or fulfilled if we cannot see ourselves as our Creator sees us, if we cannot understand and embrace the identity he has given us. We will seek identity and love in all the wrong places and from all the wrong people, striving to fill the empty space that God created in us, and which he alone can fill.

As always, we had a great week in Eagle Nest: VBS went well, we got a lot done on the cabins we worked on... but most importantly we came home with a better sense of who God is, and who we really are as well. With this renewed foundation, we can learn to walk and grow confidently in him.




KOINONIA SUBMISSIONS

Death Cab for Cutie released a song back in 2008 called "I Will Possess Your Heart." For weeks now, a line from that song has been repeating like a broken record in my thoughts:

You gotta spend some time, Love. You gotta spend some time with me. And I know that you'll find, Love— I will possess your heart.

It's not all that deep or complex a concept: if you love someone (and especially if you want him/her to love you back), you have to spend time with that person. When we're in love, we can't get enough of another person. We think of him or her nearly every waking hour, and we long to be with him/her when we're apart. We're always making plans for when we're next together, and we seem driven to make that other person smile, to make him/her happy in any way we can. We go out of our way to show him/her that we care. We respect that person's feelings, his/her wishes, and we learn as much as we can about his/her past and dreams for the future.

And all of this, obviously, takes time. We have to—no matter if it's in person or via all of the creative and advanced technological options available to us in this day and age—stay in touch. We gotta spend some time together. So I have to ask—who possesses your heart?

Mine is possessed by a number of things: my family, my friends, the church, my boyfriend, my job. I invest in these people (or activities) because I care about them deeply, because I believe in them. I find happiness in these places. I draw strength and comfort and a sense of purpose. I strive to please these people because I truly want to. I spend almost all of my time with them, and they possess my heart.

And sometimes they tug it in vastly different directions, pulling me apart like silly putty. I'm investing myself in people and things that can't always give back what I want from them. I would do anything for these people, but only because serving them genuinely makes me happy.

But then I read the Bible and feel a sense of longing for the love that David had for God. What must it feel like to love someone so much you dance through the streets just to sing his/her praises (2 Samuel 6:14-15)? Or like Abraham, who was willing to sacrifice his long-awaited son in obedience to God (Genesis 22)? Or like Mary, who washed Jesus' feet with her hair (John 12:3)? These were people whose hearts were wholly possessed by God, who would do anything for Him, and likely wanted to spend as much time as possible with Him.

In John 14:15 (NIV), Jesus says "If you love me, you will obey what I command." Okay, so when we love God, we will obey Him. Later, in John 14:31 (NIV), Jesus even tells us how to express our love for God: "The world must learn that I love the Father and that I do exactly what my Father has commanded me." We express our love to God through obedience.

So how do I get to that place of deep love? I'm quite aware of all of the wonderful and amazing things God has done for me—the blessings in my life, my salvation—and I am humbled and grateful for these. But I'm not sure they generate a sense of deep, long-lasting love within me. I know how to obey God's word, but I don't feel that I obey out of a sense of love; rather, I obey out of gratefulness

and a sense of responsibility.

When I think of learning to love God, I want a step-by-step plan, a formula I can follow. I want the Scriptural roadmap to a close, loving relationship with God. Tell me how to do it and I will do it. I'm good at following directions. Just tell me exactly how to accomplish the end goal and I will make it happen.

Scripture, however, leaves me sorely disappointed in this line of thinking. In Philippians 2:12-13 (NIV), Paul negates my belief that I should have any control in learning to love God: "Therefore, my dear friends, as you have always obeyed—not only in my presence, but now much more in my absence—continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose."

....What? Could you be a little more specific about what "work out... with fear and trembling" means? No, Paul couldn't be more specific. Because there is no roadmap. There is no formula or stepby-step guide to learning to love God. Instead, God "works in [us] to will and to act according to his good purpose." Translation: God works in each of us individually to teach us how to love and trust Him, and then to obey Him (the outward expression of our love for Him). In other words, we have to let God do the teaching. We can't teach ourselves.

When I hear the lines of the Death Cab for Cutie song above, it resonates powerfully with me. I imagine God saying those words to me, frankly reminding me that I can't love who I don't know, who I haven't experienced intimately. If I want to love God, if I want Him to possess my heart, I have to spend time with Him. The author of the song was telling the woman he loved, "I know if you would just spend some time with me, you'd fall in love with me. I know you well enough to know that. Now it's your turn to know and love me... so let's spend some time together."

I think very often in church we talk about loving God as if it is the most natural inclination of the human body and mind. I think it was meant to be, but then that thing with the snake and fruit happened, and we've been dealing with "unnatural" inclinations ever since. If I'm being honest, my first thought in the morning is often not about the God for whom I'm trying to live my life and deeply love; no, it's usually about what I have to do that day, who I'm going to see, and how I'm going to make the most of the day. But when I get around to meditating on Him and His word, I feel that longing for a deeper love, a closer bond. I want to love Him like I know I should, like I love and serve the other people who possess my heart.

So maybe the solution is very simple, if not crystal clear: if I want to love God even more than I love the other people in my life, I should start by spending even more time with Him, by getting to know Him intimately in the ways He chooses to reveal Himself. I'm not sure what that time will look like; I'm not even sure how I'll do it yet. But I know the one singing to me, the one who calls me "Love" and desires time with me—He will teach me how to love Him back.
