


KOINONIA

Bible Study / Sunday School Classes use these opportunities to invite the people we minister to and meet to join you in your Bible study class. We must be about reaching our city for Jesus.



The youth group had a great Spring, closing out a series on the book of John (studied out of the “Life Books”) on Sunday nights and studies on hospitality and what God expects of us on Wednesday nights. Now we have a very busy Summer ahead of us! We have a ton of events planned, as well as our regular Wednesday night Torn Curtain meetings.

Our bigger events include XFuge on Mission Summer Camp in Glorieta June 18th - 22nd. We will spend the week learning about God during scheduled quiet times, Bible studies, preaching and group discussions. Then we take that knowledge and apply it in a real world mission setting, being the hands and feet of Jesus. We also have free time and tons of fun events thrown in there.

We have our local mission trip, Operation Oasis - Joy Junction, coming up July 16th - 19th. The actual mission project will run from 10:00am - 2:00pm every day. We will be helping Joy Junction, a local home-

less shelter, with a variety of projects. The main one being setting up a garden that the residents will later work to help supply their food. After we are finished at Joy Junction each day we will have a “fun” activity planned.

We will have events sporadically throughout the Summer on Sundays. These include a hike on June 10th after the mission luncheon, a movie day on July 8th after the 11:00 service, a trip to the zoo for on July 22nd, our typical 5th Sunday S.O.S on July 29th, and a Guys/Girls Night on August 5th. As I said before, we will have Torn Curtain every Wednesday except for June 20th (Camp), June 27th (VBS), and July 4th. For this event we meet on the East lawn of the church at 6:30 and walk to Montgomery Park on Comanche, where we have a short devotional and play ultimate frisbee, volleyball, or push ball. Parents can pick their youth up at 8:00 at the park. Additionally, the student ministry has a rafting trip planned for the college and career group (18 and older only) on July 21st.

I have had a lot of questions about when our upcoming youth (students who will be in 7th grade) are able to join us. We will have a big kick off event, our Mess-tival, for our Fall activities on August 8th and that is when they will officially be youth group members. Then our fall events will proceed as normal following this event. We do have some exciting changes to how our Sunday nights are run that will be announced towards the end of the Summer.



William Tyndale was an English scholar and reformer who became a leading figure in the Protestant Reformation leading up to his execution for heresy by the Holy Roman Empire. Tyndale was heavily influenced by the works of Desiderius Erasmus (1466 - 1536), who made the Greek New Testament available in Europe, and Martin Luther (1483 - 1546) a seminal figure of Protestant Reformation. Although partial English translations of the New Testament were available, as well as, the officially denounced Wycliffe Bible, a Middle English translation of the Latin Vulgate, Tyndale is most well known for his translation of the Bible into English in direct opposition to the laws of the Roman Catholic Church and of England. Notably, Tyndale's translation was the first to translate a complete Old and New Testament drawn from original Hebrew and Greek texts.

While in hiding from the agents of both the church and England, using the then new technology of the printing press to widely disseminate his works, Tyndale authored many other

influential writings which included treatises denouncing unbiblical practices of the Catholic Church, extolling the principles of justification by faith and divinity of Jesus Christ, and vocally opposing Henry VIII's multiple marriage annulments. Tyndale was eventually arrested for heresy and condemned to death. It is recorded that his last prayer was for the King of England's eyes to be opened; this seemed to find its fulfillment just two years later with Henry VIII's authorization of the Great Bible for the Church of England, which was largely Tyndale's own work.

Tyndale's work and meticulous scholarship toward the formation of the English Bible cannot be understated. The famous King James translation written nearly 100 years later heavily draws upon Tyndale's work. Even modern translations including; the Revised Standard Version (RSV), the New American Standard Bible (NASB), and the English Standard Version (ESV) have drawn inspiration from Tyndale's writings.

Atonement

noun atone-ment \ ə- 'tōn-mənt \

1. reparation for an offense or injury : satisfaction - a story of sin and atonement - He wanted to find a way to make atonement for his sins.
2. the reconciliation of God and humankind through the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ (coined by William Tyndale)



MINISTRY IN FOCUS:

HELPING HANDS

Helping Hands is a vital ministry that has been a part of our church for over eleven years. It began with former church members, Dave Walton and Lynn Boynton, who lead the ministry for many years. When Dave moved, Ira Pinkston took over.

The ministry does exactly what it says. It brings together various able-bodied people in the church to help other people (mainly widows and single mothers) with tasks that they are not physically able to do and may not know who to trust when hiring someone to do it. The Bible clearly teaches us it is our responsibility to take care of the widow and those less able than us, and that is exactly what this ministry is here to do.

When asked about a highlight from the ministry, Ira said that getting to help Liz Boynton (Lynn Boynton's widow) definitely brought the ministry full circle for him. The ministry that Lynn helped start is now helping to take care of his wife in his absence. This may not have been the reason that Lynn saw this ministry as important enough to invest his time in, but we know it would make him extremely happy and proud. Additionally, Ira stated that while God gave us the spiritual gift of serving others, we are by far more blessed by the people we help than any blessing we could give them.

With all the highlights and joys of a ministry, also come difficulties. When asked about these, Ira said that administration of this ministry is definitely what makes it most difficult. It can be difficult to find out about the needs since people tend to not want to ask for help. However, it can also be very difficult to find enough volunteers to fulfill the needs. Additionally, there is all the communication between both parties.

In the future, Ira hopes to see so many people involved in Helping Hands that we can fulfill all the needs within our congregation and the surrounding neighborhood. Not only ministering to our own congregants, but reaching people for Christ through this ministry.

Just Some Parting Thoughts

In case you haven't heard yet, this June I will be moving to San Antonio, Texas to live closer to my boyfriend of over a year, Matt. The last few months have been a whirlwind of planning: resigning from my job, applying to a new one in a new state, writing and re-writing checklists of all I need to do and in what time and order (anyone who knows me well can imagine the number of lists I have going concurrently). All of this to say, this will be my last article for *Koinonia*, and after the last 13 or so years at Del Norte Baptist, I have a few last tidbits I wish to share with my church family before I leave.

Humans are messy, and our walk with God can be, too.

The walls of Del Norte silently watched me mature from adolescence into young adulthood, and oh!—the embarrassing secrets these walls could tell! I was precocious, academic, and anxious to boot about my future, what people thought of me, and most existentially, where I really

stood with God. I bounced between confidence and despair about the state of my salvation; I projected onto God the treatment I saw exchanged between the people around me. Where adults would not forgive each other, I believed God would one day draw a line in the sand and tell me “That’s it! No more! You clearly weren’t meant for heaven.”

But with the passing of years came the deeper comprehension of—if one ever truly can comprehend—grace. I learned over time to work harder at seeing myself the way that Scripture attests that God sees us: as the apple of his eye, the image-bearers, the ones he so destined for eternity with him that he willingly died for us to make it happen for those who would only choose to believe. And God taught me these impressions of himself through relationships with his children—the adults who took me under their wing to minister and mentor me, such as Andy and Joni Byers, Dave Phillips, Kristy Peck, Pat and Julia Gore, Carol Red, Lewis Williams, Amber Nash, and Aven Tirrel. The ways these people and so many others treated each other was a constant reminder that God is good, he is forgiving, and he is gracious to us messy, undeserving humans.

And most importantly, just as those people did not forsake or abandon me when I made stupid choices, when I hurt others, when I seemed like a lost cause... neither did God. He kept those beautiful people in my life to guide me to where I am today. May he bless each and every one of them for their faithfulness to the kingdom of God, to the church body, and to me.

The Word of God will knock you down... and pull you back up.

Because we are messy humans on a messy walk in this world, I've learned my desperate need for God's wisdom through his Word. The more I study the Bible the more dynamic I perceive it to be. My most vivid recollection of this lesson was experiencing it in Eagle Nest, on one of our many summer youth group mission trips there to teach VBS. I was in high school and neck-deep in jealousy and mistrust of the other girls my age in the group; I was part of what Andy Byers once termed "a triangle of girls." As much as I tried to paint myself the victim of other girls' abuse, I was just as much a part of the problem.

Then one morning God brought me to Galatians 5:14-15 (ESV): "For the whole law is fulfilled in one word: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' But if you bite and devour one another, watch out that you are not consumed by one another."

Those words pierced me to the core—that's exactly what we girls were doing. We were biting and cutting each other down with our words and looks and attitudes, and thus guaranteeing the destruction of our fellowship with each other and the group as a whole. That was the first time I understood the weight of conviction: it's a keen stabbing in the heart when God uses his word to correct. But there's a sweetness to that pain as well, because he faithfully swoops right down to build us up towards something better, something more holy and just.

We would do well to always listen. We won't, but "if we are faithless, he remains faithful" (2 Timothy 2:13, ESV). See? His Word lifts us right back up.

Let God do His thing (a.k.a, Stop trying to control the world, Richelle)

I have diagnosed anxiety. I probably have had it my whole life. As a result, I learned to cope by controlling literally everything that I could to protect myself from surprises and unknowns... which creates more anxiety. It's a vicious cycle. Even worse, I developed a bad habit of feeling the need to control the dangers in others' lives as well.

Nothing can cure one of that compulsion faster than mentoring teenagers. NOTHING.

As I mentored preteen, teenage, and occasionally even college students here at Del Norte (and as a public school teacher), I was often forced to watch them trudge through the same mistakes, ignore the same advice, and endure the same consequences as I had. It hurts to see someone walk into the pitfalls you've warned them about, but that's the thing about faith and this messy journey—you gotta let God do his thing.

God works through the messes we make. He could definitely work without them, but he faithfully gets down in the muck where we're wallowing and points us towards higher ground. We can't keep those we love from making the dumb mistakes we've already suffered through. We can't save people from themselves. We can love and listen and advise and pray... but we can't save. Only God can do that. And if we try to control the lives of those around us in some misguided attempt to protect them, we're robbing God of his role in their lives, and in ours. God is the preserver, protector, defender, and teacher. He uses us in those capacities, it is true, but in the end only Jesus can save us from ourselves. If that was at all untrue, the cross would never have happened.

So there you have it, three micro-lessons God has taught me during my time here at Del Norte. On a more personal note, I will miss this church dearly, and all those who cared for me and spiritually nurtured me in these first years of my walk. May God bless you all richly with his grace, love, and peace for tenderly guiding me to a deeper understanding of his nature and will. I have found a wonderful church in San Antonio with people who passionately love God and his kingdom as much as here at Del Norte. God is pushing me on, and I fearfully and joyfully go. I humbly ask for your prayers over these next months, for God's ongoing provision and peace, and that he would use me for his glory.

I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.
