


## A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

All the other Sundays the Celebration Choir and Orchestra did an excellent job leading the 8:30 service participants in God-focused worship. Likewise, our Praise Team, has provided the worship leadership for our 11:00 service.

# GA's 2015



What an awesome year we had with the girls in GAs this year!! Girls in Action (GAs) is a missions focused class where girls ages 1st thru 6th grade come together to learn about missionaries all over the world, their work, their families, the struggles they face, and about how they can learn to be a missionary in their areas of influence whether it be home, school, church, wherever they find themselves.

Each month we have a focus Bible story and a verse from the scripture passage we learn about that repeat and discuss throughout the month.

This year we talked about Jesus bringing Lazarus back to life from John 11, we learned about how Isaiah was called by God and drew out the description of a seraph from Isaiah 6:1-8 (WOW), and about Jonah's reluctance to go to Nineveh and tell them about God's expectations for them and how they needed to mend their ways before they ran out of time. Each of these stories prompted discussions about how God can do anything, how He equips us to live for Him, and how we need to be ready to make good decisions based on His word.

This year we also focused on different ways we can pray. We prayed as a group aloud and silently. We took written prayer requests, exchanged them and prayed for each other. We even wrote our requests on the window when we talked about how Daniel prayed three times a day in front of his window that was opened up toward Jerusalem even though it was against the law (Daniel 6).

Along with the Bible events we also learn about missionaries serving all over, from Atlanta, Georgia to Russia; Canada to Korea. We learn about these people and their families. We learn how they work in their community to share the gospel and teach about God and Jesus. This year we even learned about a man who talked to people about Jesus while selling ice cream from a Kona Ice Truck!

The activity that the girls seem to look forward to most each month is our cooking week. In January we made Peach Cobbler when we learned about missionaries in Atlanta. We made Pisang Goreng (Indonesian Banana Fritters) in October, and ice cream in a bag in recognition of the Kona Ice truck driver.

All and all it has been a great year with some amazing girls!

# BECOMING **DOERS** OF THE WORD

Last year, the College and Career Sunday school class read Henry Blackaby's *Experiencing God*. It was a study that required us to read scripture daily, and as a result, I developed a habit of setting aside time every morning to complete the questions and read the verses for the study. When we'd finished the book, I found myself wishing I had something else to read, something that could teach me about God each morning as I started my day. Long story short, I decided to carve out time every morning to read my Bible and pray.

My life hasn't been the same since. Over a year later, I continue to make time every day to read the Bible, preferably in the morning, before the concerns and business of the day distracts me. I'm usually reading three books at a time—two from the Old Testament, and then a Gospel. I try to read a chapter from each every morning. I don't follow a devotional or any set plan; if God has laid something on my heart—a spiritual question in which I need direction—I will pray first that he lead me to a passage that can offer clarity. But most mornings I start with prayer and then ask God to speak to me through his Word, to deliver any message or tidbit of truth he has for me that day. Sometimes he speaks, sometimes he doesn't. But whether I hear from him or not, my time in his Word is precious to me.

I didn't always feel this way. For many years, I read my Bible out of obligation, like a textbook, because I thought a good Christian should. I didn't feel any particular motivation or desire to read my Bible. I didn't

understand when people said that God spoke to them through scripture. But as I worked through the *Experiencing God* study and began to feel God teaching me truths through scripture, it occurred to me that maybe I could hear from God by reading his Word.

As I spent more time in the Word, I learned more and more about the Holy Spirit. I began to feel convicted about flagrant sins in my life, and desiring change. I began to realize that although I was saved by grace through faith in Jesus, God wasn't done changing me. He began to teach me about sanctification, the fruits of the spirit, and purity. It became obvious to me that although my life seemed clean and tidy, my heart was not. I gave easily into temptations, lacked self-control, and struggled to want to love others, even though I knew Jesus commanded it. And perhaps the most powerful (and heartbreaking) realization of all was that God's spirit had been living within me for years, trying to guide and grow me, and I'd simply never paid attention. I had the very power of God living within me, and yet my life was not so different from any other twenty-something.

So I started to pay attention. When I read my Bible in the mornings, I asked the Holy Spirit to reveal to me the message I needed to hear for that day. For one span of months, he taught me about purity: how the things I did in my day-to-day life and the way I behaved were directly influenced by the state of my heart. He reinforced this teaching through a whole semester of learning about purity through the small group class

I taught with Aven Tirrel. I began to make earnest changes in my life, embracing the victory over every sin which I knew Jesus had achieved on the cross. I started to notice changes. I experienced freedom from a sin that had dogged me for years. For the first time in my life, I actually started to feel like the new creation of which Paul speaks (2 Corinthians 5:18).

Next, the Holy Spirit deepened my understanding of purity by teaching me about self-control. Coincidentally—although let's be honest, probably not, given how the Spirit works—our College Bible Study on Monday nights began to cover passages that kept drawing me back to a need for self-control in my life. I was still working to gain victory over the aforementioned sin, but now the Spirit was directing my attention to the role of my heart in the problem. He began to point out all of the areas in my everyday life in which I was not submitting to his wisdom.

That lack of submission was the lack of self-control. I had to change my entire way of thinking. Gaining self-control no longer became a game of always saying no to the “bad” things, the temptations, but rather saying yes to God's intentions. I started to realize that if I was striving for the things of God, if my heart was after the promises of scripture, self-control would develop naturally from that outlook. It wouldn't be as hard to say no to temptation, because I was more focused on what I was saying yes to: purity, sanctification, intimacy with God, obedience. It was by no means a lesson learned without stumbling—God blessed me with an accountability partner to help me on my way. But for the first time in my life, I could really feel the change.

This long-winded narration has all been to say that my life would never have changed without the Word of God, without his Holy Spirit guiding, correcting, and teaching me. I recently viewed a sermon online by a pastor named Doug Jones. He was preaching on the Holy Spirit's work within us (as opposed to through us), and one point he made was that as Christians, we must accept that we are lifelong learners. The minute we believe that we understand everything about our faith and our walk with God—and, even worse, God himself—we close our minds and our hearts off from growth and instruction. Sanctification—the being set apart for holy service to God—is a process that won't be finished until we reach heaven. There will always be room to grow.

Second Timothy 3:16-17 (ESV) says, “*All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work.*” Similarly, Joshua 1:8 (ESV) records God's words: “*This Book of the Law shall*

*not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all this is written in it. For then you will make your way prosperous, and then you will have good success.*” To me, that sounds like a God-given manual for spiritual success and fulfillment.

But again, rather than viewing the Bible as a textbook, I'm starting to see it as a diary God's been writing to his people. Paul writes in Hebrews 4:12 (ESV), “*For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart.*” This has been my experience with his Word over the past year. It cut me to the heart in a painfully beautiful way. Prior to investing time in and developing a craving for his Word, the wisdom of James 1:22-25 (ESV) described me perfectly (a hearer only): “*But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves. For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man who looks intently at his natural face in a mirror. For he looks at himself and goes away and at once forgets what he was like. But the one who looks in the perfect law, the law of liberty, and perseveres, being no hearer who forgets but a doer who acts, he will be blessed in his doing.*”

In other words, God's Word speaks to our true identity, the people we were made to be. By the power of his Spirit within us, we can become that new creation, we can finally achieve freedom and change and growth.

I'm only a year into my new journey of heeding the Holy Spirit's guidance and receiving truth from God's Word, but I'm already humbled by what he's taught me about myself and—more importantly—what he's revealed about his awesome, patient, gracious nature. Reading his Word and spending time hearing from his Spirit has become so essential to my day that if I skip that time for whatever reason, I can soon tell a difference in my attitude, outlook, and thus behavior.

So in sharing this experience I've had, I hope you will begin to devote yourself to the Word of God daily. Whether we are seeking guidance, help, comfort, truth, peace, or change, the Holy Spirit inside of us—the very power of God who raised Jesus from the grave—will speak to us. He will transform us, if only we will submit ourselves to his leading. And he is patient with us—if you don't believe me, read the Old Testament. He is a God of abundant patience with our rebel, wayward hearts. And his Word is a gift by which we can know him more. Whatever we are dealing with—*whatever we are seeking*—let's begin our search in the Word of God, led by the Holy Spirit within us.


From the Baptist Childrens Home




Shoes...
