Eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.



WORSHIP IS MY LIFE



You probably just thought to yourself: “Of course Ira can say that since that is his job: Worship Pastor.” But it is also your job. Let me explain why I think worship is my life, and why it should be yours as well.

At the age of twelve I asked Jesus Christ to come into my life and soul, and in doing so, I died to my old self. Colossians 3:3-4 says, “Your old self has died, and your new life is kept with Christ in God. Yes, Christ is now your life, and when He comes again, you will share in His glory.” (ERV) My old self was ruled and controlled by what I wanted. My new self was supposed to be controlled by what God wanted. But, of course, since I am a sinner, every day I find myself doing what I want, without regard to what Christ might want. In Romans 7:15 the Apostle Paul

ponders the same concern: “For what I am doing, I do not understand; for I am not practicing what I would like to do, but I am doing the very thing I hate.” (NASB)

So, how do I work on that problem of “my wants” over what God wants? When I asked Him to be my Lord and Savior I buried my old way of life to live a new way. Romans 6:4 says, “We were therefore buried with Him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.” (NIV) So, we can take that analogy of being buried and raised “to newness of life” to help us get through each day. We must continually, each and every moment, die to the old way and live in the new way. The only way to be successful in this venture is to live in a continual state of worship.

What then, exactly, is worship? Delesslyn A. Kennebrew wrote an article in *Christianity Today*, and I think she gets to the point: “True worship is defined by the priority we place on who God is in our lives and where God is on our list of priorities. True worship is a matter of the heart expressed through a lifestyle of holiness. Thus, if your lifestyle does not express the beauty of holiness through an extravagant or exaggerated love for God, and you do not live in extreme or excessive submission to God, then I invite you to make worship a non-negotiable priority in your life.”

Let us move forward, together, as we discover how to make worship a “non-negotiable” priority in our lives. Every thought, action, and motivation needs to take place in light of our desire to worship God.

Student Ministry Update

The student ministry is in the middle of a series called “Who Are You?” In this study we are looking into the importance of finding our identity in Jesus. To be an adolescent is to be given the task of finding one’s own identity. Our students are being told every day from our culture, the schools, and even sometimes their families that they are to find their identity in their accomplishments, their future jobs, or in their families. Not that there is anything wrong with being well accomplished, having a family, or enjoying your career, but these things are not suitable for someone to define who they are. The only thing that is consistent in our life... is God. When we build our lives on the foundation that is faith in God we are defining who we are with the only thing that does not change, accepts us as we are, and will never leave nor forsake us.

Our next series is going to be called “Mission Impossible” in which we are going to be taking a look at people that were called by God to do the impossible. Our culture (and even many in the church) tells our students that we can do anything that we set our minds

to, but unfortunately that is simply not true. Looking at Matthew 19:26 we see what scripture actually says, “Jesus looked at them and said, ‘with man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible.’” Scripture testifies that our God calls people to be a part of things that are above and beyond their capabilities, but there is a subtle yet pivotal difference between the secular wisdom and scripture.

Secular wisdom tells us that there is no limit to what you can do. Sadly, this is commonly taught to children, discussed in youth groups, and even spouted from the pulpit. Our faith, by contrast, proclaims that we have very clear limitations, that we can do nothing perfectly right. However, we are loved and empowered by God anyway. The true difference between the secular wisdom and Christian knowledge is that as the secular world stands up and proclaims, “Look at what I’ve done!” The Christian knows that all we could do on our own is mess-up, so he proclaims, “All praise is to God! For anything good done is by Him, from Him, and through Him.”

A Christian must be humble in everything, because more so than anyone else a Christian should know just how limited he or she is. However, this does not lead us into hopelessness, because we know that through God’s limitlessness and our frail willingness, the world can be changed. The Mission Impossible series will kick off with our Experiential (EXP) Night on January 16th.

The student ministry will also be helping out with the Melodrama during the middle of February. We are also looking at attending a few events through the Baptist Convention of New Mexico to both have a good time and teach the students a little bit more about the connection that we share as brothers and sisters in Christ.

MINISTRY IN FOCUS

ESL CLASS

DNBC has hosted an English as a Second Language (ESL) ministry for a few years now. Lillian Moon originally came to Carmen Verbeck with the idea, and Carmen quickly became the coordinator. The idea was to invite adults and parents from Governor Bent, Del Norte High School and Cleveland Middle School, and if they brought their kids, the children and teens would go to the appropriate evening activities for their age. The ministry meets on Wednesday evenings from 6:30 to 7:30 in room 205B.

The class focuses on both speaking and writing English, but does emphasize speaking more. They start with the alphabet and build the language from that foundation. English is Carmen's second language, so she knows what it is like to have to learn it. In fact, she says that has helped her as a teacher, because she is now able to teach the way she learned. She pointed out that there are some things that she knows as a native Spanish speaker to help others who are learning English. For example, she tells students that in Spanish when you speak your tongue is down in your mouth, but in English when you speak, your tongue does not stay in one place. She also helps build their confidence to be able to speak loudly by telling them to imagine they are angry, rather than speaking quietly due to their nerves. This is what Carmen did, and it helped her. Little tips like these not only help the students learn English, but show them they are not alone on this journey of learning a new language.

Carmen considers the ministry a blessing to her. She always wanted to be a missionary, but she thought it meant going away somewhere to the mission field. She now realizes, though, that God has brought the mission field to her through the ESL ministry. Also, Pablita Vigil has been teaching with the ministry since the beginning and has been a huge blessing to both Carmen and the ministry itself. However, with all ministries there are difficulties as well as blessings. The main difficulty associated with the ESL ministry is the lack of volunteers to teach. This is such a problem that Carmen has had to assume both a teaching role as well as the coordinator role for the time being. She said they could especially use volunteers with teaching experience, as well as native English speakers.

For the future of this ministry, Roy and Carmen see it growing. They would like for it to take up two or three rooms and have multiple levels (beginner, intermediate, and advanced possibly). They would also love to have a trainer for their teacher volunteers to help them with strategies and methods for teaching a second language.

When asked what people could do to help, the first thing Carmen mentioned was prayer. Please pray for this ministry, that they would receive the volunteers needed, as well as for the people that are attending. If you would like to volunteer for the ESL ministry or if you know someone who might like to attend (they are always accepting new students), you can call the church office, and they will get you in contact with Carmen or Roy.



BOOK REVIEW

THE ADVENT OF THE LAMB OF GOD

I recently finished reading *The Advent of the Lamb of God* by Russ Ramsey as my devotional. It is one of three books in the *Retelling the Story Series*. This particular one is intended to be read during the Advent season (the twenty-five days leading up to Christmas). There are twenty-five chapters, which means you read a chapter a day, and since each chapter is only about four pages it works out perfectly as a devotional. I was able to read it each morning in no more than ten minutes. The series seeks to do exactly what it says, retell the story of Jesus in novel format.

Most of you are probably familiar with the concept of Advent, but it might be more of the consumer concept that involves a calendar that has a gift hidden inside for each day. They make a variety of these involving everything from candy, to toys, to Harry Potter socks (I might be partial to the latter of these). However, this was not at all what Advent was intended to be. Advent is a season of the Christian calendar that is meant to focus on the waiting and preparation for celebrating the birth of Jesus. Essentially, the goal is to help us prepare for Christmas in a manner that keeps us focused on the real purpose and meaning

of the holiday, rather than getting lost in all the commercialism that so easily distracts us. The word literally means, “the arrival”, meaning a time of preparing to celebrate the arrival of the Son of God, the Messiah, King Jesus.

The *Advent of the Lamb of God* tells the story of scripture up to the point of Jesus. The goal of this book was to retell scripture with an emphasis on the need for and then the arrival of Christ. The thing that was most powerful for me in reading this is how interconnected everything in scripture became for me as I read this. I knew all the stories I was reading, but I had never read them in this format, in this order, that allowed them to flow so fluidly from one to the other.

Additionally, Russ is a wordsmith, and his writing was able to bring parts of scripture to life for me as I had never experienced before. For example, when he was talking about Israel’s love for God he says, “In their creativity and in their learning, in their working and in their resting, in their building up and in their tearing down, they were to love him. They were to love as whole people, in all their weakness and in all their strength. On their best days and on their worst, in the darkest hours of their loneliest nights and at the tables of their most abundant feasts, they were to love him.” Wow! That is just a small excerpt from an entire section that absolutely took my breath away! It challenged me to love God. Above all else, in the good and the bad - to love God, in joy and sorrow - to love God, in my coming and my going - to love God, to love God...always.

The book is divided into two parts: “Awaiting the Messiah” and “The Savior has Come”. While it does not necessarily go in order it covers the span of scripture from Genesis 3 to Jesus’ baptism, which we know signified the beginning of His ministry. One of the things that I liked most about this book was that at the beginning of each chapter, under the title, Russ referred the reader to the scripture that he was paraphrasing and focusing on for that chapter. This aided me in using this as a devotional. I would read the chapter, then turn to the scripture and read it in light of the perspective and language that Russ used.

There are a few things that I think are important to clarify with a book such as this (and Russ addresses most of these in the introduction of the book). This is not scripture, nor is it a substitute for the Bible. Russ admits to engaging “in some speculation” in the book by imagining how certain conversation happened or how specific people felt or what they thought in various situations. This is why I would consider it a devotional book only. Russ states that his goal for the book, “is that it will deepen your understanding of the wonder and glory of the story of the Bible,” and that is exactly what it did for me.
